The Dispersed of H2O

I hope this letter comes in good timing, as I'm guessing that many of you might be overwhelmed by the amount of emails and updates you are receiving these days in light of COVID-19. However, I want this letter to be encouraging and hope-filled in the midst of some strange circumstances surrounding us, because God is still good and still doing amazing things in and among us in H2O Kent.

What *has* happened:

Last week, we learned that Kent State University decided to close campus and go completely online for the remainder of the Spring semester. Our staff team and core leadership team spent several days together following the news on March 10th as we decided how to respond. We sent out a thorough letter to our church informing them that we are unable to have any large group gatherings for the semester and also to encourage them to still pursue community in small groups or through video chat in ways that do not compromise health or spread the virus throughout this time. Although we were going to have more people participate in our spring break trips than ever before (over 70!) we decided that it was necessary to cancel all three trips (including our trip to Boston). We have and are still mourning the loss of many ministry

(On a side note, Jana and I are celebrating that right in the midst of this weird season, we just paid off the last of my student loans which totaled nearly \$30,000 and are now officially debt free!! Thank you to everyone who has supported us financially and contributed to this reality!)

What *will be* happening:

You might ask me and our staff, "Now what?" "Are you out of a job for a couple months? Is this time for vacation?"

Not exactly.

In fact, it did not take me long before I created quite a list of tasks I can now begin and ways I can fill up my schedule. However, our staff team, after hours of prayer and seeking God, has decided to see the remaining semester as an opportunity to find creative and new ways of doing ministry. We want to trust in God to shepherd and teach our church community in unique ways. So far we've sent out a Lent devotional for people to use every day to read their bibles together and created a map sharing device to find others that live near them to spend time with. We want to encourage our church to be on mission together as well, looking for ways to serve the least of these in this season. Personally, I hope to spend much of my time in a

- **Community.** We have had couples, staff, and students over until recently we began switching over to other ways of communication (skype and phone) and we see it as a great opportunity to open our lives to the dispersed
- **Prayer.** I look forward to taking frequent prayer walks on campus and seeking God in an intentional way during this time. I would like to fast and read the bible for extended hours throughout the weeks to come.
- **Ministry team development.** I hope to contact supporters and stay connected to our ministry partners, cultivating the incredible relationships we have
- **Extra tasks.** There are also several tasks I haven't had much time for this semester that I can now tackle, such as writing, creating some ministry and teaching materials, and planning for summer and fall projects

1 Peter 1 begins, "To God's elect, exiles scattered throughout..." In a very real way, we can now relate to Peter's words to the scattered church nearly 2,000 years ago, as we write to, call, and visit the scattered church of college students throughout Ohio. Please pray for us in this unique time to "not give up meeting together" (Heb. 10:25) and continue pursuing God in creative and substantial ways.

The way of the world

It has been said many times, these are strange times. As many of you know, we are in US citizenship process for ZigZag. The first stage has been completed (after over 18 months). The second stage of immigration is still in progress. We saw that with their timeline there was no way we were going to make Easy Teasy's mid-June surgery date. Through December we were in constant prayer about his citizenship application. Letting the Lord know the desires of our heart. On the other hand since January we have been constantly working on paperwork in addition to contacting everyone possible (the President, Congressmen, NVC, USCIS, Ombudsmen, etc.) and trying to expedite the process. God has heard an answered our prayers and it seems like everything will come through in time. THEN...

Up until 2 days ago life for us was same old same old. The only difference was keeping up with the world and hearing news from the US. But 2 days ago, the President closed the border and shut down our international airport. Then yesterday news came out there is a first case in our country. Honestly, we are not concerned for ourselves. I believe that our family would ride the virus without harm.

On the other hand, we are concerned for this country where social distancing is not socially acceptable nor socially possible (most homes have 20 people in them). Like many people here, our house help has type 2 diabetes, so my understanding is that she is immune compromised. Because of a situation El Padre was in, we feel like she shouldn't come to our home for the next two weeks. She doesn't understand it. She told me this AM. They say if someone touches something than I touch it I will get the virus and she was laughing as if germs spreading that way was the strangest idea in the world. She concluded, if so, we are doomed. At the same time, she was loudly denouncing the sickness in the name of Jesus. We do see strong faith here. At the same time, there is an inkling of belief here that if you have enough faith it will go well and if you don't have enough faith it will go against you.



At this point we don't have ability to leave and the US has said leave your country now

or maybe you won't be able to return for an indefinite amount of time. Our boys do have visas from last year that are still valid, but we would really prefer to obtain ZigZag's

immigration visa before returning to the US. Of course, the embassy has closed visa services, but they seem willing to work with us by emergency appointment, if necessary.



So just like so many other people we are in a time of waiting and uncertainty. But our level of uncertainty although unwelcome, is bearable. We are so very grateful because we still have food to put on the table. We still have work and an income. In our country life is very difficult for those who live day to day for their food. They don't have tomorrow's food yet. Tomorrow they will wake up to make the necessary money for tomorrow's food – then go to the market and buy it. But with so much shut down it is going to be very difficult for people. Please pray with us.

Coronavirus pandemic heightens the needs of the most vulnerable

LOUISVILLE — Remembering “[the least of these](#)” takes on greater significance during the coronavirus pandemic.

With many Americans losing the ability to work, school being canceled for millions of children, and childcare centers being shuttered in many places, the challenges of people already living on or near the edge of society become magnified.

“We can pretty much guarantee that there will be heightened food insecurity,” said the Rev. Rebecca Barnes, coordinator of the Presbyterian Hunger Program, and “we probably all know people already who have been laid off or can’t have as many hours or are told not to come into their shifts.”

Partners of the Presbyterian Hunger Program and the Presbyterian Committee on the Self-Development of People work on these kinds of issues throughout the year, but the current crisis — brought on by the coronavirus — has fueled discussion from Capitol Hill to Kentucky to California about how to help those in need.

“I’m thankful for the conversations opening up,” Barnes said. “People are using the phrase, ‘We’re all in this together.’ Well, that’s always been true, but we don’t always

act like that. This is a great invitation for us to really examine some of the policies and systems we have in place. Are we really ready to figure out how it is that we are in community together, how we’re a country together and how we take care of the most vulnerable?”

On Friday the U.S. House of Representatives was set to consider a massive stimulus bill and state and local governments as well as churches, charities and the private sector are coming up with ways to help people facing economic hardships because of the coronavirus.

“People are trying to respond the best way they can,” said the Rev. Dr. Alonzo Johnson, coordinator of the Presbyterian Committee on the Self-Development of People.



But, even with federal aid likely on the way, there’s still plenty more for individuals or organizations to do, particularly at the advocacy level. So the Presbyterian Mission Agency’s Compassion, Peace & Justice Ministry has put together a list of resources to help people continue to do social justice work during the COVID-19 pandemic.

“We must remember that COVID-19 is an added burden to those who already struggle to survive, those who theologian Howard Thurman characterizes as people ‘with their backs against the wall,’” Johnson said.

Some populations to think about as more and more restrictions are put into place in various U.S. communities to reduce the spread of the virus:

- People who may have a harder time paying their rent or utility bills.
- Children lacking the structure, protection and meals that schools provide.
- Families on public assistance.
- People who are living in communities with contaminated water during a period when Americans are being told to wash their hands more.
- Inmates in overcrowded prisons.
- Homeless people without access to hand sanitizer or running water or who must rely on sometimes overcrowded shelters.
- Isolated seniors who may need groceries dropped off or to receive a “thinking of you” card in the mail.

From connecting with advocacy groups, such as the Poor People’s Campaign and We the People of Detroit, to contacting your local food pantry, to finding creative ways to volunteer, there are ways to fulfill the church’s Matthew 25 mission to act boldly and compassionately to serve people who are hungry, oppressed, imprisoned or poor.

With COVID-19 restrictions in place, Barnes said, “we’re not going out to all these places to eat and to entertain ourselves. Are there things we can be doing for the community?”

Chaplains work in a unique environment, and rarely serve near their home presbyteries and churches. That's why PCCMP serves them wherever they are in the world.

A Prayer for Chaplains
