


Eyes to See

In November we heard the news that Easy-Teasy would need to have surgery. I was talking through the details with my friend in the Sahel. Toddler not able to walk for 3 months in a cast. She was very sympathetic, but with such a positive approach that is always healthy for my soul. After empathizing about how it will be very difficult, she mentioned to me, "Imagine all the Moms, nurses and doctors that you will get to know and interact with during this time." It made me think in a way I had not thought before.

In the hospital with Isaac as I was pretty exhausted on day 2 and ran into another mother in the kitchen. Her nonverbal 10-year-old had back surgery 3 weeks ago and they had spent the last three weeks in ICU. Her daughter's wound was opening up again and they were looking at taking her back into surgery tomorrow. She said 4th floor children's was so restful and peaceful (compared to ICU). I tried to empathize with her and could just see her exhaustion. Tears came to her eyes and although I haven't seen her, but this Mom, whose shoulders hold up so much, continues in my prayers.

There is a special chair called a spica chair for children who are in leg casts like Easy-

Teasy was scheduled to be in. We found a spica chair in Chicago about the time that we were picking up our mini van there. Unfortunately, Easy-Teasy wasn't able to use the chair because his brace was so very straight. I found a Mom to pass along the chair so that her son could use it. When she arrived for the chair, I asked when her son's surgery would be. Her 4-year-old son has already been through 5-6 surgeries and there isn't one currently planned, but she said she knew there would be more. She said, you need to come and see him. Her very small guy's legs were covered in scars. She had another child in the car with multiple medical challenges. Another Mother carrying more than her share of difficulties who again is in my prayers.



I am so very grateful for my friend who opened my eyes to this opportunity. I am grateful for the opportunity to be able to look outside of myself from time to time during a time that is a bit challenging. We are so grateful for the deep and challenging friendships that God has placed in our lives in the Sahel.

HOPE FOR THE FALL

This past month our church community studied the book of Philippians together and God has really been speaking to me personally through it. In this letter from Paul we see that the church in Philippi sent a member of their community- Epaphroditus- to aid Paul while in prison (Phil. 2:26). They likely expected him to be in pretty ragged shape, since Roman prisoners were not fed or taken care of like modern day prisons in America. Some of them were probably wondering if Paul was even still alive.

However, despite what we would expect, Paul seems to be thriving! He had plans to travel throughout the unreached parts of the world proclaiming the gospel to the Gentiles and those plans come to a grinding halt upon his arrest. Yet, this is not how Paul sees it. He says in Phil. 1:12-13, "What has happened to me has actually served to advance the gospel" because the entire palace guard has heard of his imprisonment for Christ. Not only that, but other believers around Rome are growing in their confidence to share the gospel because of Paul's example and strength.

Paul is able to utilize this incredibly inconvenient and life-threatening new reality for the Kingdom of God!

That is my hope for this coming school year. I did not wish for a global pandemic. I did not ask for our spring break trips to be cancelled and for the school semester to go online since March. I had no idea things would change so much and for so long. However, I want to take the posture of Paul. I pray that our church has the faith to say "this too has served to advance the gospel." I trust that somehow God will use this season of social distancing and isolation to bring about new life at Kent State, however that looks! **Please pray that our staff team can discern the practical implications of on-campus ministry this year through the guidance of the Holy Spirit!**

Praying for one another

How a Mission Yearbook prayer and other unexpected prayers helped turn me around

Just how powerful is prayer? On Sunday morning I was greeted by an email from a colleague at the Presbyterian Mission Agency with these words: May you feel the love and receive strength from all the prayers coming your way this day.

It turns out my name was listed on Friday's Mission Yearbook devotional — which features short stories on the work Presbyterians are doing and asks for prayers for the ministries being done.

I was surprised, touched and then thankful, for I didn't realize how much I needed this. In an instant, I felt the stress leaving me and my energy returning. As the day progressed, several other emails came from all around the country from people I did not know, all reaching out and telling me that I was in their prayers.

The last email I received was from a new worshiper of my virtual worshiping community, Old Stone Well Farm, telling me how she woke up with me on her mind and that she has been thinking about me and praying for me all day. Her prayers carried me through the rest of my day.

I will always remember the first time I experienced how strong and powerful the connection is between brothers and sisters in Christ when we pray for one another. I

was going through a rough patch in life, facing many decisions as to what my next steps would be. Specifically, where was God calling me to serve next? Was it time to leave a congregation? What did God really want from me? What if I made a mistake? What if I was listening more to my wants and desires? I was making myself sick with all the questions swirling in my head.

One night, after tossing and turning for what seemed for hours, I shot up in my bed to grab my iPhone to see what time it was. Ugh. It was only 9:30 p.m. I kept staring at the illuminated numbers in front of me. They were starting to blur a bit as tears of frustration began to form. But as the time went from 9:30 to 9:31, the tears retreated. I felt this strange warmth wash over me. It was nothing I had ever felt before and, for a second, it unnerved me. It was so unreal.

I soon surrendered and allowed my soul to sink into a sea of calm. A certainty of God's guidance settled my mind. For some reason, I just knew I wasn't alone. That was the first night in a long time where I actually slept soundly.

The next day, I went to the gym to get a quick workout in before starting yet another over-scheduled day. As I jogged on the treadmill, I kept thinking about the strange peace that fell upon me and how mysterious it was — dare I say, it was heavenly, divine? This wasn't just a stressed-out body finally caving in to long-overdue sleep. This was different.

My thoughts were interrupted when one of the gym owners appeared in front of the treadmill, smiling at me. I slowed my pace down a bit and turned down the music playing on my iPhone. What he said next, made me come to a complete stop: **"We prayed for you last night."**

I stared at him in disbelief. My legs grew weak as I stammered, "What?"

"We prayed for you last night," he repeated, explaining that for some reason he had a strong nudge to lift me in prayer during Bible study at his church. I couldn't help but ask what time this was. It was about 9:30 p.m.

Yes, it was that time. I remember well — and always will remember — how in that moment when 9:30 becoming 9:31, a peace passing all understanding came to me, tucking me in tightly, holding me closely and whispering to me a soothing bedtime story of how God is with me. There is nothing to fear. Nothing to fret.

"We prayed for you last night."

Yes, I know, I told him. I felt those prayers. I really felt them.

This church took out the pews to help feed L.A.'s hungry

Immanuel one of several Pacific Presbytery churches meeting growing need with support from Presbyterian Hunger Program, Disaster Assistance

LEXINGTON, Kentucky — As June turned to July, Immanuel Presbyterian Church in Los Angeles needed a place to store food.

Its direct food service to people in need had skyrocketed from 120 households a week before the COVID-19 pandemic to more than

2,000 a week as the virus staged a resurgence in California that has resulted in it being the state with the most coronavirus infections in the country. Immanuel, in L.A.'s Mid-Wilshire/Koreatown area, was running out of space to keep food – at one point jerry-rigging cooling ducts in a hallway to create improvised, temporary cold storage. Then church leaders cast their eyes on its Westminster Chapel.

Immanuel's Session expressed openness to making it a storage space before, and the morning of July 3 it approved removing the pews.

"By 4 o'clock that afternoon, half the pews were gone," transitional co-pastor the Rev. Andrew Schweibert said. "It was like, 'Boom! Move it.' By Monday, they were all gone."

The church also had electrical outlets in the chapel converted to accommodate the needs of refrigerator equipment, and has made other modifications to the facility so that it can help the community experiencing health and economic calamities from the coronavirus that have been particularly hard on Southern California.

"We are all-in right now, all-in," Schweibert said.

In an application for a Congregational Emergency Food Grant from the Presbyterian Hunger Program (PHP), the church detailed its direct food service going from one morning a week, serving around 120 families, to six days a week, serving

1,700. In addition to regular clientele — primarily of people who were homeless, low-income, immigrant, and elderly — the church was seeing more people who were gainfully employed just a few weeks before the pandemic took hold. Most households being served were between four and nine people.

The church relied on numerous local partnerships to keep its food pantry going through the influx of need.

It's a situation that is replicated in a handful of churches around the Los Angeles area: Congregations that were serving a few hundred people with their food programs were now faced with more than 1,000 people in need.

"It's people who have never stood in food lines before," said the Rev. Heidi Worthen Gamble, mission catalyst and hunger action advocate for the Presbytery of the Pacific. "It's heartbreaking. It's devastating."

In May, the presbytery held a virtual concert that raised more than \$10,000 to address hunger in the area. Worthen Gamble says the presbytery and churches have actively sought support in numerous ways to address the overwhelming need in Southern California. Immanuel Operations Director Virginia Beaboa said there have been days during the crisis they did not know where food would come from for the next day — and then an unexpected donation came through.

The Presbyterian Hunger Program grant helped supplement the local donations and partners.

"The work that congregations are doing to feed and house people is so important, especially now," said Andrew Kang Bartlett, PHP Associate for National Hunger Concerns.

It takes numerous volunteers to keep the pantry at Immanuel Presbyterian Church going. Volunteers load up reusable tote bags with content including fresh produce.

"We all have to practice social distancing," Schweibert said. "The staff and volunteers know the risks, but they see this as an essential service. They are choosing to be here and work, and work as volunteers."

Immanuel is partnering with other churches in Presbytery of the Pacific's Homelessness and Housing Task Force, including Hope on Union, Wilshire, St. Mark's, First Hollywood, Calvary Hawthorne, and Bel Vue Presbyterian to share resources in the area. Worthen Gamble said that finding volunteers can be a challenge for churches with older congregations more vulnerable to COVID-19 or in lower-income areas where the majority of members work multiple jobs to make ends meet. A number of those workers have also contracted coronavirus, she notes.

Another challenge is moving food between churches and accessing potential supplies. One of the things Worthen Gamble said would be extremely helpful is a refrigerated truck because "we are carrying perishable items, and one thing COVID has not stopped is the legendary L.A. traffic." The presbytery, she and Schweibert said, has gotten by through borrowing and renting trucks. But buying one could really increase their capacity to obtain and distribute food.

In addition to an earlier emergency grant to support the food pantry, the Presbytery recently received a Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) grant to support the purchase of a truck that Worthen Gamble says has put it closer to that goal, though additional funds are needed.

"One of the marks of a Matthew 25 church is feeding those who are hungry," said the Rev. Jim Kirk, Associate for Disaster Response (U.S.) with PDA. "As the numbers of positive test results continue to climb, the numbers of those who are hungry will continue to climb. ... It is impressive to see the way the Presbytery of the Pacific is

facilitating a collaborative approach to enhance food security. The efforts of the presbytery will make a long-term impact for those so severely impacted by the pandemic."

In the long term, Schweibert said Immanuel hopes to get back to its plans before the pandemic hit: to transition to long-term work with people in need to address issues such as employment and housing.

"As more people are hurt by the economic downturn, access to affordable housing will be critical to keeping the number of unhoused people low," Kang Bartlett of PHP said. "So, we are grateful for the PC(USA) congregations that participate in Congregation-Based Community Organizing coalitions, which are advocating for affordable housing around the country."

Schweibert and Worthen Gamble both said they are concerned about what will happen when moratoriums on evictions and rent collection are lifted.

"Unless something comes around to provide rent help, we're looking at a huge disaster toward the end of the year," Worthen Gamble said. "We're also really looking for ways we can help churches build more infrastructure for what will be enormous demand."

Schweibert said, "We're looking at having our food time as a time to help people get connected to services that can help them find housing. We want to build relationships that last and help the neighborhood and the community."
