

After about a months worth of phone calls and emails, he is officially being sponsored by Clinton United Presbyterian Church's Youth Group! We thought it would be wonderful to let you all know a little bit about him and reintroduce him to the congregation.



Meet Bishal, he is now 9 years old! He lives in Lowairpowa, India with his parents and one sister. His favorite activity is playing ball and he loves to sing. Through our continued support over the years Bishal has been provided with Child Protection, Clean Water to drink, Healthcare and an Education.

Through our support and the support of others, Bishal and his community have been provided with: Water, Sanitation and Hygiene. New wells and water filter plants helped almost 700 people in his community get access to clean water. 35 rain water collection projects are benefiting over 1,900 schoolchildren.

It is our hope that an entire new generation of our Youth get to know and interact with Bishal. We have his address and are able to interact with him as little or as much as we would like. If you or your child would like to send Bishal a birthday card, a greeting card, a handwritten letter, a drawing or a small package, please let us know.

We ask you to please pray for our Youth, for Bishal, his family and his government, that there may be peace in his country. We thank the support of this congregation and our Youth, for their continued aide and support of this little boy and his community.

### **Guess People Are Funny**

There used to be talk around this town,  
Of the terrible water we had.  
Folks said it was ruining our progress,  
And for business it was bad.

We griped about the plumbing,  
And how it rusted out so fast.  
Always buying new water heaters,  
Cause the old ones wouldn't last.

We carried water from cistern wells,  
For making our coffee and tea.  
Some hadn't been cleaned in thirty years,  
And unhealthy as could be.

Now that we have this good, clean water,  
Don't hear much about it anymore.  
I wonder if folks have forgotten  
Just what it was like before?

We just neglect to express our thanks,  
When things are bright and sunny.  
But when things are wrong, then we complain.  
Guess people are sure funny.

People are the same everywhere - we forget the difficulties when it gets easy and everyone wants to make their life more comfortable. But in this comfort, the people in the Sahel amaze me, as most of them live outside in 55 degrees as well as 120. Some don't even own a coat - dressing the same in this 65 degree differential - and they wake up and bathe with water either from the tap or water that has been sitting out in 55 degree temps! They use outdoor bathrooms - if they have one. Outdoor kitchen, Outdoor family room, A straw or mud brick wall

house. Dust everywhere. In the US we spend a bit of time bundled up in the cold, walk to our cars, and go into our homes that are the same temperature give or take 10 degrees all year round. Here the house temperature varies by more than 60 degrees over the year! Our house is made of concrete and because of size it doesn't change temperature as quickly as outside. We probably get 35-40 degree differentials. I know I wouldn't want to live in 60 degree differentials.

We are creatures of comfort and we take our comfort for granted. I have so much to remember to be grateful for!

what is now known as "the Aspen Project" because aspen trees send out these crazy long root systems that similarly pop up above ground to check for good soil to grow new trees.



## BIBLE EXPLORATIONS: GOD'S CALL AND POVERTY

# Helping others begins with identifying with them

Which Harry Potter character are you? Which famous clown are you? Which "Friends" character are you?

Quizzes like this abound on the internet, claiming to tell us who we identify with most in pop culture. And they're not just on the internet. I remember a rogue questionnaire — "Which Princeton Theological Seminary professor are you?" — That a couple of seniors with too much time on their hands wrote.

While I'm not sure how my preferring glazed donuts contributes to being most like Ronald McDonald, the fact is that we often connect with some characters better than others. Whether it's our life circumstances, physical appearance or the personality to which we aspire, some shoes just fit more comfortably.

It happens when we read Scripture, too. Think about it: Is it easier for you to identify with the father, younger brother or older son in the story of the prodigal son?

Where we see ourselves in the story often reveals what we understand God's call to be. Yet when we are willing to put ourselves in someone else's shoes, we will see a different way to join Christ's mission.

Psalm 40:1–11 gives us the opportunity to place ourselves in a couple of different places to understand how God might be calling us to respond to eradicating poverty. This psalm seems to be a full-throated, joyous song of praise, with the author filled with gratitude for God's work. There are incomparable wondrous deeds that have been multiplied and glad news of deliverance to be proclaimed.



Now let's place ourselves in the first two verses as a family who had been stuck in systemic poverty. The psalmist describes our gratitude because God has heard our cry. The Lord has drawn us up from the desolate pit, out of the miry bog, and made our steps secure. The psalm gives no hints how God accomplished this rescue, but let's imagine. Could it be that people mired in a bog of poverty might have their steps in life made more secure via access to better education, job training and mentoring, and legislation confronting systemic racism?

Now let's return to our own place in life, rather than that of the family in "desolate" (verse 2) poverty. While those of us reading this magazine come from many financial backgrounds, it is safe to say that most of us are not impoverished. That means when we identify with the psalmist who says, "I delight to do your will, O my God; your law is within my heart" in verse 8, we can imagine the Holy

Spirit working through us, nudging us to follow God's law by addressing poverty in our communities. By joining Jesus' work to free others from the pain of poverty, we can join the psalmist as he tells God that we "have not concealed your steadfast love and your faithfulness."

We don't need internet quizzes to tell us who we are. We are children of God, and as such we need to look beyond who we think we are or want to be and insert ourselves into the story of poverty that's growing in our nation.

Pray that the Holy Spirit will inspire a unique ministry for you, your family or your church, so that the impoverished in your community can experience God using you to answer the closing prayer of the psalmist: Do not, O Lord, withhold your mercy from me; let your steadfast love and your faithfulness keep me safe forever.

As you share steadfast love and faithfulness, perhaps you'll realize that the One with whom you're identifying the most in this passage is our God, who puts a new song in our mouths.

# Experiencing the fullness of Lent

## Lent at a glance

In the last few centuries of Christian tradition, the season of Lent emerged as a time of penitential preparation for the celebration of Jesus' resurrection from the dead. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday and ends with Holy Saturday, spanning 40 days (not counting the six Sundays). Holy Week, the final week of Lent, begins with Palm/Passion Sunday and concludes with what is known as the "Paschal Triduum" or "The Great Three Days" — Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and the Easter Vigil.

**Public worship** Repentance and reconciliation are central themes of the season of Lent. Accent these themes in worship by:

- Emphasizing the element of confession by including — or extending — a time of silence for self-examination. Gradually lengthen this period of silence throughout the season.
- Leading the confession and pardon from the baptismal font, highlighting the nature of baptismal discipleship as dying to sin and rising to new life in Christ (Romans 6:1–11).
- Learning a new musical setting of the Kyrie eleison ("Lord, have mercy"),

perhaps from another culture or liturgical tradition, and singing it throughout the season of Lent.

## Personal discipleship

Three recommendations for spiritual growth during the Lenten season are:

- Use a daily lectionary (visit [pcusa.org/lectionary](http://pcusa.org/lectionary)), Lenten devotional, six-week Bible study or some other reading plan to immerse yourself in Scripture throughout the forty(-six) days of Lent.
- Explore six different spiritual practices (contemplation, journaling, meditation, etc.) during the six weeks of Lent and then choose one to focus on in the following year.
- Work to renew or restore broken relationships by reaching out to estranged friends or family members with a personal letter or (where appropriate and possible) a visit.

**Ministry in the church** In the early church, Lent was a time to prepare new believers for baptism. Here are suggestions for Christian formation in Lent:

- Hold confirmation classes — or culminate a yearlong program — during Lent, with reaffirmation of baptism upon profession of faith at the Easter Vigil.
- Organize a new-members class in the season of Lent, with experienced members designated as mentors and companions.
- Think strategically about evangelism and hospitality during the season of Lent so you will be ready to welcome (or welcome back) those who attend at Holy Week and Easter.

**Mission in the community** Lent calls us to confront the brokenness and suffering of the world. Here are three practices related to social justice and the healing of creation:

- Get involved with an organization that advocates for racial justice and reconciliation or seeks to address discrimination, prejudice and bias in public policies.
- Volunteer with an agency that helps people who are poor, hungry and homeless in your local community, or works to eradicate systemic poverty in the nation and world.
- Take inventory of your ecological footprint, and then find ways to reduce your consumption, increase what you recycle and use cleaner sources of energy.
